

# The Royal Guernsey Light Infantry

A Service of Remembrance to commemorate the return and disbandment of the regiment

The Town Church, Guernsey
Saturday 30th November 2019

**Private 257 Ernest Quevatre** lived in the Vale and was one of the first men drafted into the Royal Guernsey Light Infantry. He left Guernsey on  $1_{\text{st}}$  June 1917 onboard the SS Lydia and remained with the regiment throughout all of its active service, including witnessing the bitter losses at Les Rues Vertes in Masnieres, Passchendaele and the Lys Offensive in the spring of 1918.

On Sunday  $14_{\text{th}}$  April 1918, in a railway cutting on the Hazebrouck-Bailleul line their commanding officer, Colonel de Havilland, ordered the roll to be called. Private Quevatre was one of only fifty-five men left to answer the regimental list.

Almost a year later to the day on  $12_{th}$  April 1919 Ernest Quevatre was granted his honourable discharge. Today his granddaughter, Susan Hunt, will unveil the rededication of the RGLI memorial, representing all those families of the men who served. She is proudly wearing Ernest's medals.

As the congregation gathers in the Town Church, music is played by the Guernsey Concert Brass (directed by Mr Alan West).

Please stand for the arrival of the Bailiff of Guernsey, Sir Richard Collas, who will be escorted to his place by the Rector and the churchwardens.
